## \*NOTES\*

- \*1 Most of the Canadas were various size flocks exiting the ponds early in the count after spending the night.
- \*2 Two adults and 3 juvenile swans exited the ponds, flying S. were earlier seen from the E. knoll on the pond.
- \*3 Two females were seen together by the pond team moving S. to N. paddling in the north lagoon outlet ditch.
- \*4 One adult eagle perched just S. of the constructed wetlands in a medium size deciduous was seen briefly.
- \*5 A SY sub-adult male on a sprinkler head near the main W. parking lot and an adult female hunting meadows.
- \*6 A SY juvenile in S. meadow grove. Same, or similar aged Cooper's was later seen N. of the Osprey platform.
- \*7 Both NW. adults on territory. One SW. adult in SW. quadrant, a rufous-morph adult in various SW. perches.
- \*8 Merlin vocalizing and flying low from N. to S. across S. paved trail toward woodlot SW. of the warehouses.
- \*9 The shrike was seen S. of 212<sup>th</sup> St, high in a willow and flew before it was determined if it was an adult, or not.
- \*10 All four jays were seen at once in the tops of the small conifer trees at the far SE, corner of the east knoll.
- \*11 Some of the closer warblers were identified as Audubon's, but not all were further determined as to race.
- \*12 The finch was seen briefly towards the end of the main dike road disappearing into the east side willows.

## **MORE NOTES**

SY – refers to (S)econd (Y)ear (when aging raptors) although it may be less than a year old, it is past the HY, or (H)atch (Y)ear. Any raptor that is not determined to be a HY, or SY is considered AHY, or (A)fter (H)atch (Y)ear.

Western Scrub-Jay numbers appear to be on the rise and this could be an indication of a nesting pair close by.
