Commercial crime has included theft of various items, including trucks, trailers containing loads of furniture, motorcycles, other cargo, sheet metal, and wiring. Businesses face criminal behavior every day, from vehicle prowls and thefts to shoplifting.

Here are steps
you can take to
guard your business
from criminals
and
protect your

Don't give criminals an "excuse" to set foot on your property! Use this guide as a tool. "Case" your business as a criminal would. Check for the following:

WINDOWS

Windows should have secure locks, auxiliary locking devices, and shatter-resistant glass.

Never stock valuable items near windows. Always double-check and secure at closing. Keep clear of signs and advertisements that may obstruct the view of a passerby or police officer.

ROOF

LIGHTING

Install exterior lighting to increase visibility in parking lots and around doors, windows, skylights, and other entry points.

EXTRA TIPS

Keep a current inventory of your business machinery, including brand, model number, serial number, and description of each item. Maintain key control procedures.

Use heavy cables to lock down computers. Be sure your safe is fireproof and securely anchored.

Deposit cash daily and vary the hours. Leave the cash registers empty and open at closing.

FENCES

Lack of secure fencing can be a risk factor.
A fence can be the one extra step that a criminal does NOT want to take to get onto your property.
A two-foot high concrete barrier erected around the fence can prevent drive-through.

LANDSCAPING

Trim back trees and shrubs near doors and around windows to eliminate hiding places for would-be thieves. Branches should not be lower than six feet and bushes should be under three feet. Plant thorny bushes under windows where a potential burglar might attempt to gain entry.

DOORS

All exterior or security doors should be metal or solid-core wood.

All side and rear doors need peepholes for employee safety. Install alarms on unlocked doors.

Place height guides at door entrances.

PADLOCKS

Padlocks should be made of steel and kept locked at all times.

Remove serial numbers from your locks to prevent unauthorized keys from being made.

ENTRANCES

All entrances should be protected with deadbolt locks that have a bolt extending at least 1.5 inches into the door frame.

BOXES:

Remove any items, like stacks of boxes on the sides of the building, that may provide access to your rooftop.
